While the face of technical education has certainly changed over the past 45 years, our commitment to our students has not. Nashoba Valley Technical High School is a regional technical high school established in 1969 to serve students grades 9–12 and also provides post-graduate programs for those between the ages of 18 and 25 years old in all career areas on a space available basis. Nashoba has earned an impressive reputation for producing community leaders as well as providing a vast amount of community projects for our district towns. With an enrollment of approximately 760-plus students from eight communities, Nashoba Valley Technical High School offers career preparation in 18 technical programs.

The Learning Schedule: Three 12-week trimesters consisting of eight 45-minute periods set in a four block schedule, five days per week. The school schedule alternates one week of academic classes with a week in a career-technical area for grades 9 through 12.

The Year in Review

Nashoba's enrollment continued to grow during the school year and once again we welcomed a significantly larger student body. This year our security system was updated with additional security monitors at the front and rear entrances. Construction has completed on our new athletic facilities including a new sports complex that consists of a multipurpose turf field, tennis complex and a practice field, as well as state-of-the-art track, new softball and baseball fields, tennis courts and field hockey. To complete the renewal of our athletic facilities, the final touch was to add new bleachers and gym floor. Our Dance and Art studio is near completion and will enhance our pre-school and Theatre Arts and Design & Visual programs by allowing students to showcase their talents.

Nashoba continues to embrace educational opportunities for our teachers through summer professional development opportunities as well as by serving as a satellite campus for many local colleges' advanced graduate programs.

As we continue through a time of economic uncertainty we can assure you that at Nashoba Valley Technical High School, students will still receive a technical education of the highest quality with the most current state-of-the-art equipment while still providing our district members with a fair and equitable assessment. Our Engineering Academy, entering its second year at Nashoba Tech, is a selective program targeting high achieving math and science students who are interested in entering various engineering, electronics/robotics, or bio-manufacturing fields.

Special Academic Programs

Advanced Placement, Honors and College Preparatory courses are available in all core subjects. Foreign language, music, theatre and additional elective courses are offered for all four years to all interested students.

Dual Enrollment

The Dual Enrollment program is a state sponsored program that allows eligible NVTSHS students the opportunity to enroll in courses at a local college while they are still in high school. The Dual Enrollment Program is available to any junior or senior who meets the criteria adopted by both the

State and the School District. Juniors who are eligible and recommended by teachers/administration may elect to enter the Dual Enrollment Program and take courses their junior and senior years at a two- or four-year public college or private institutions in Massachusetts or New Hampshire. The program allows a student to attend Middlesex Community College, Mt. Wachusett Community College, U Mass Lowell or Fitchburg State University on a full time basis, while still enrolled at NVTHS as a high school student. Credit for the courses applies to both the high school and college transcripts. Upon completion, students receive their high school diploma from Nashoba and one or two years of college credit. Many Nashoba students in recent years have graduated with an Associates degree from a college and their high school diploma at the same time. Also, individual study programs for talented students are directed to their area of excellence. Many of our students are accepted at such distinguished institutions as MIT, Ithaca College, Emerson College, Boston University, and University of Massachusetts, among others.

Community Service Projects

Nashoba is unique in its approach to community service and its relationship to its district towns. Students and their instructors travel to various sites within our district to work on community service projects that have been approved and selected for their benefit to the community and the learning of our students. The students perform all necessary work for the district towns to complete their requested project. The Community Service Program educates students in a real world setting and allows the towns the benefit of observing Nashoba students at work, creating a lasting tribute to their efforts and having a major project completed without over expending limited town resources for capital improvement.

Student Activities

Nashoba sponsors an extensive program in intra-scholastic sports including varsity teams in 16 current high school sports, with equal opportunities for both male and female students. Next year we hope to add tennis and crew as new team sports. Other extracurricular activities include Student Council, National Honor Society, Music Honor Society, Yearbook, Kick Off Mentors, Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD), Skills USA, Student Leadership, Peer Mediation, Chorus, Drama, and many special interest clubs. **No user fees** are imposed on any sport, school sponsored club, or activity.

Continuing & Community Education

More than 700 adult students per semester attended the Continuing Community Education Program in late afternoon and evenings at Nashoba. More information can be found on the NVTHS website.

Vocational-Technical Education in Massachusetts

A Pioneer Institute White Paper

*The Massachusetts Business Alliance for Education (MBAE) released a report entitled *Preparing for the Future: Employer Perspectives on Work Readiness Skills*, a project to inform educators and policy-makers about the work readiness skills that employers expect of Massachusetts high school graduates...*

“There was general agreement that vocational school graduates are more job-ready than general education or college preparatory high school graduates. In fact, a number of participants felt that vocational high school graduates were often more job-ready than college graduates.”

Also, employers felt that vocational graduates are more team-oriented, disciplined, and prepared to enter the workforce. Graduates of vocational schools were described as having superior soft skills and preparation in comparison to other graduates.

In a tight economic environment, results like these are hard to ignore.

Pioneer Institute (2013)

- Today's career vocational-technical schools are well rounded academic centers that combine rigorous, connectional class work with practical application.
- Majors in robotics, biotechnology, and engineering are offered along side traditional vocational programs such as plumbing, auto technology and carpentry.
- Higher graduation rates and lower drop out rates have become the success story of Massachusetts regional technical schools.
- A 2006 survey by Massachusetts Industry Professionals agreed "CVTE graduates are better prepared for post-high school life than most college graduates, not only because of the hard skills but also because of the workplace skills and work ethic they have developed."*

- In a 2007 brief, the Association for Career and Technical Education cited five benefits of career and technical education:
 - Enhancement of students motivation and academic achievement
 - Increased personal and social competence related to work in general
 - A broad understanding of an occupation or industry
 - Career exploration and planning
 - And acquisition of knowledge or skills related to employment in particular occupations they studied and general work competencies (p. 3)

➤ Over 60 percent of VTE graduates pursue postsecondary education, and importantly, special education students at Massachusetts VTE schools are counted among those with the highest graduation rates.
